Unlocking Real-World Skills through Community-Based Instruction (CBI)



Community-Based Instruction (CBI) harnesses the power of the community as a dynamic learning environment, allowing for the generalization of skills that promote positive post-school outcomes for our students. CBI acts as a bridge, supporting the transition from school to adult life, offering our children authentic opportunities to practice and develop skills that will help them beyond



the classroom walls. One great example of this is our SBJC Maywood Campus's strong community partnership with the Maywood Public Library located across the street. During CBI trips to the library, students delve into practical life skills broken down into incremental steps: from crossing the street safely to interacting with community members, from selecting books to using their library card. It's more

than taking a walk—it's a lesson in independence and a chance to build confidence in our learners. With this community partnership, Maywood Library has since received a grant to establish a weekly Inclusion Hour, using the funding for the purchase of new sensory materials that can now be found in their children's room.

Future plans: "To attend the 18-21 program and work."



Professional Development: Team Training

With 60 classrooms across the county and five different educational programs offered, the SBJC has been working to implement a professional development model to fit the many needs of our district. It was through a year of discussions that a framework for ongoing professional development emerged.

The SBJC Behavioral Health Department—made up of behaviorists, behavior specialists, and counselors—met regularly last school year to identify the skills needed for all of our staff to grow professionally and excel. It became increasingly apparent that a guide already existed that laid the foundation for knowledge of Applied Behavior Analysis: the Registered Behavior Technician (RBT) task list.

Leading this department and this initiative is SBJC Clinical Director Scott Rossig, former principal of our Lodi Campus. "This Team Model Approach allows us to achieve two things," says Rossig. "It allows for a student-centered focus, honing in professional development specific to those



students' needs. And it allows for staff to receive ongoing training and frequent feedback in order to continuously improve."

Using the 40-hour RBT Training (based upon the RBT task list) as the focal point for professional development, the SBJC has designed a Team Model Approach to provide individualized training for each one of our classrooms. Behaviorists lead classroom teams and individuals through instruction, modeling, rehearsal, and feedback on areas that promote proactivity; they review skills that are critical to the daily work of our paraprofessionals. Our paraprofessionals, who make up more than half of our total

personnel, are essential to our students' education. Through the use of this Team Model Approach, our paraprofessionals receive ongoing training on key ABA skills specific to their students' needs; they work towards achieving certification in being a Registered Behavior Technician; and they receive invaluable feedback and support from behaviorists and teachers. Our teachers are the experts in academic instruction, and they too benefit from continuous feedback provided by behaviorists. collaborative environment empowers every staff member to actively monitor their progress throughout the year via a "Behavioral Skills Checklist" that was designed by our Behavioral Health Department. We are embracing a growth mindset that is essential for professional development.

The ultimate goal of this approach is to elevate the quality of education we provide. By making this shift to a Team Approach Model, the SBJC is creating a comprehensive and targeted framework that ensures all staff are well-prepared.

PROGRAM SPOTLIGHT

Yoga & Mindfulness

Integrating regular yoga and mindfulness instruction into our programming for the past three years has yielded substantial benefits for our SBJC students. The practice of yoga promotes physical well-being, enhancing flexibility and coordination, while mindfulness exercises contribute to emotional regulation and stress reduction. As part of our No Barriers initiative, Lyzzette Grassi and Kellie Weiss provide instruction throughout the entire district, individualizing the practice for each student. For students facing challenges with their executive functioning, these teachings offer a non-intrusive approach to improving focus, attention, and self-awareness. Yoga and mindfulness also foster a sense of community and acceptance, promoting social skills and communication among students.
